

In the year 2000, after I received my MFA in Scene and Costume Design from Carnegie Mellon University, my husband's job brought us to San Antonio. During the first six months, I tried to contact as many people as I could in the local theatre scene. What I heard many times was "you are not in the right city". I then accepted an offer as Assistant Professor of Drama at Kenyon College, in Ohio. Professionally, my work at Kenyon brought much satisfaction. However, three years of commuting between Texas and Ohio imposed tremendous hardship on our family; so I resigned at Kenyon and started working as a freelance designer from San Antonio.

Even though I still rely on commissions from outside San Antonio for financial survival, in the few years we have lived here, I have witnessed a rapid change in the development of the arts within the city. In fact, the city has offered me diverse opportunities for growth as a designer, and to maintain myself challenged. My experience as resident designer at the AtticRep company, in residence at Trinity University, has been particularly gratifying. The AtticRep's mission of "Challenging the creative imagination of our community" and "Inspiring dialogue that informs and provokes change" has offered me the opportunity to be part of an artistic endeavor that is breaking new ground in one of the largest metropolitan areas in the in the nation. For this, I am grateful.
